
Mistakes are usually regrettably laborious and costly but, occasionally they can lead to happy and unexpected discoveries by accident. Changing one item, moving just one thread in a threading draft and you have a mistake or you have serendipity. It is possible to incorrectly thread rosepath, a standard threading pattern, while working alone or in a workshop. In March I was a participant *in Norwegian Weaving with Lila Nelson* in Duluth when I misread the ancient draft. Lila suggested that I change it or work with it and see what would happen. I chose to complete a small sample in class. I found that I was drawn to the asymmetrical draft and returned again in my studio to consider the possibilities. The xerox copy is my first larger sample. I learned much. I played around with the design motifs and colors using up some Maypole that I had on hand. Now I'll have a go with some newly acquired excellent Norwegian wools and proper sett.


